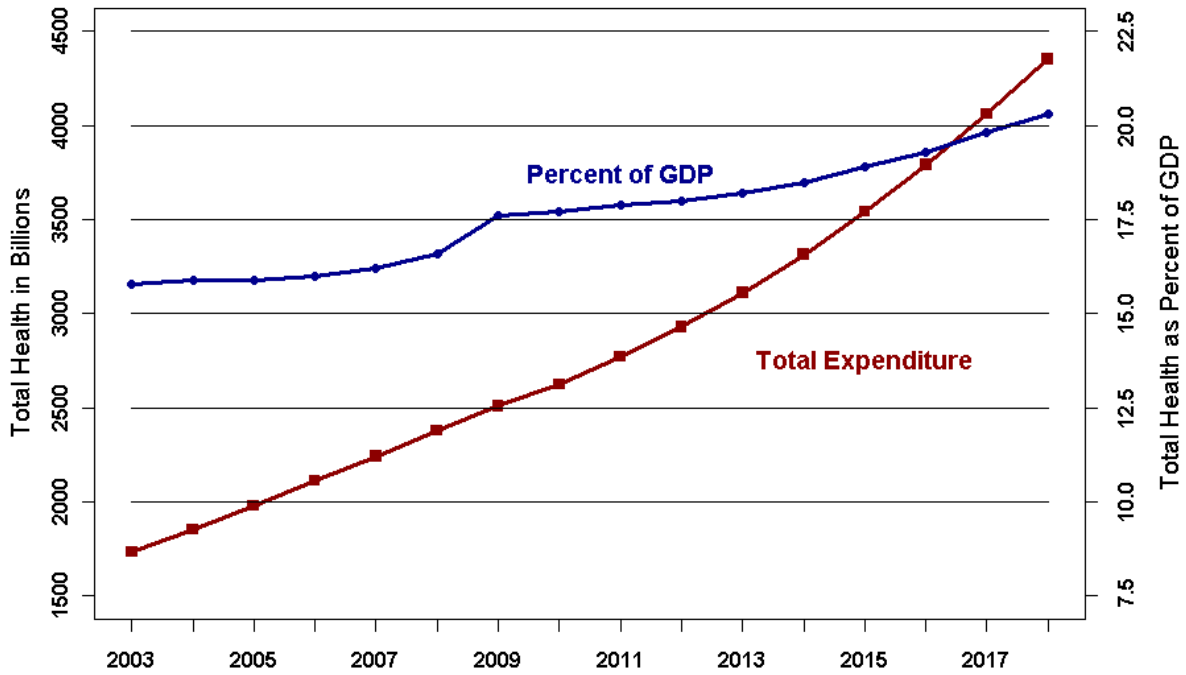
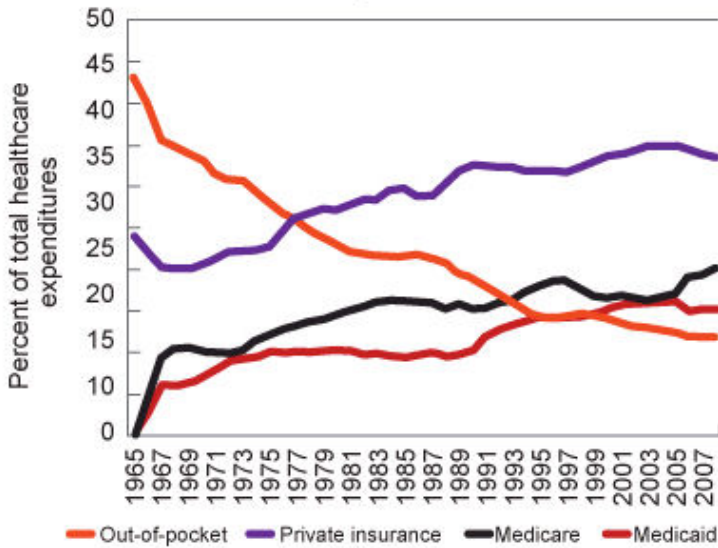


Total Health Expenditures: 2003 - 2018

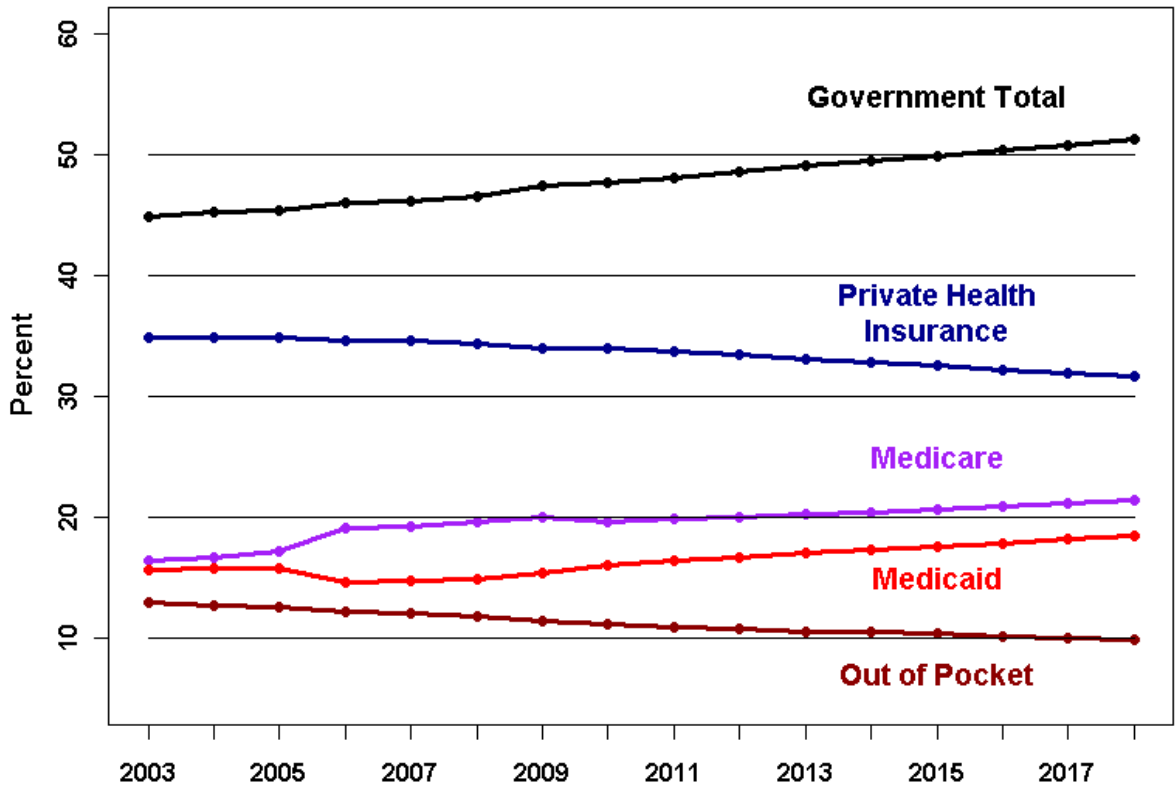


Breakdown of National Healthcare Expenditures

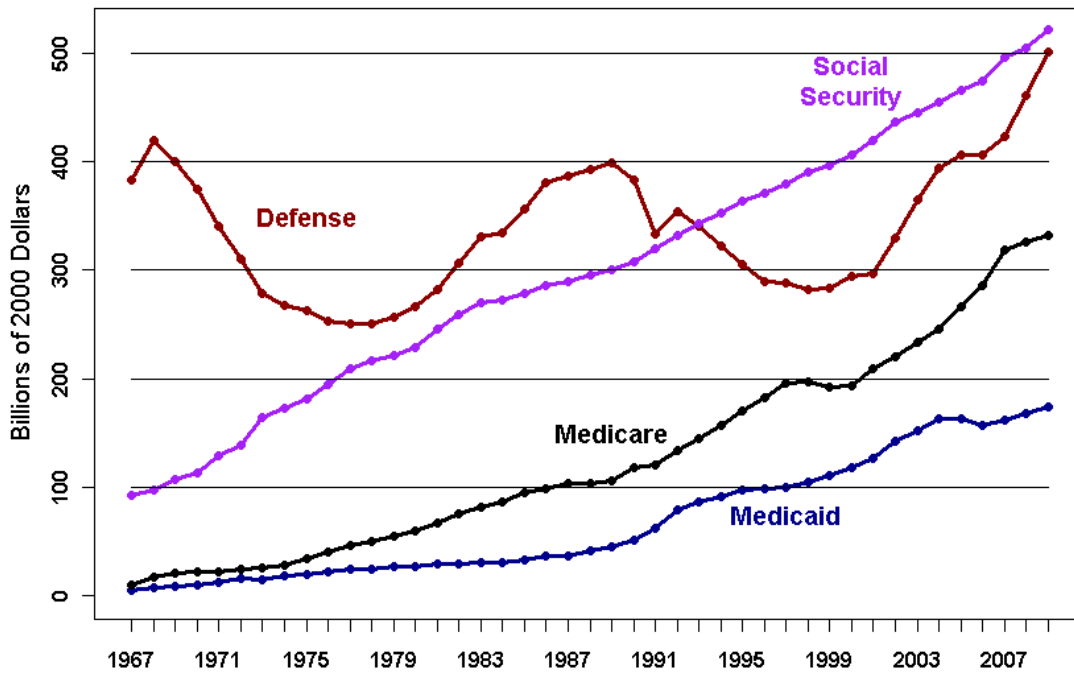

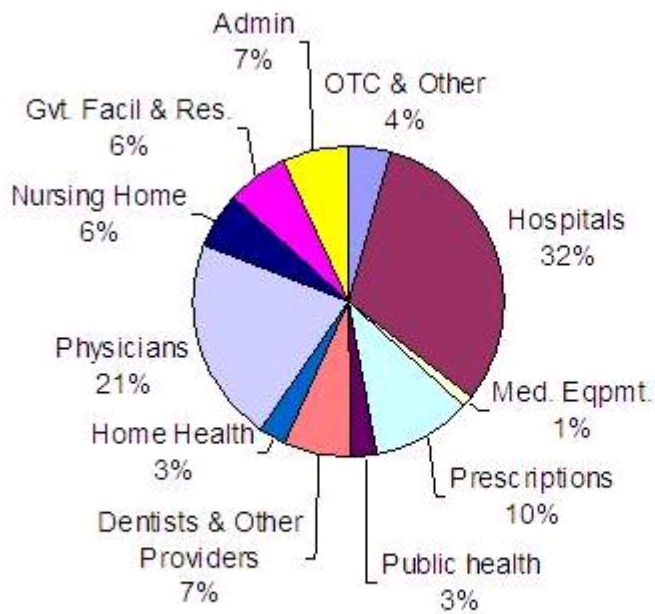
National Health Expenditures Percent Distribution 2003 - 2018

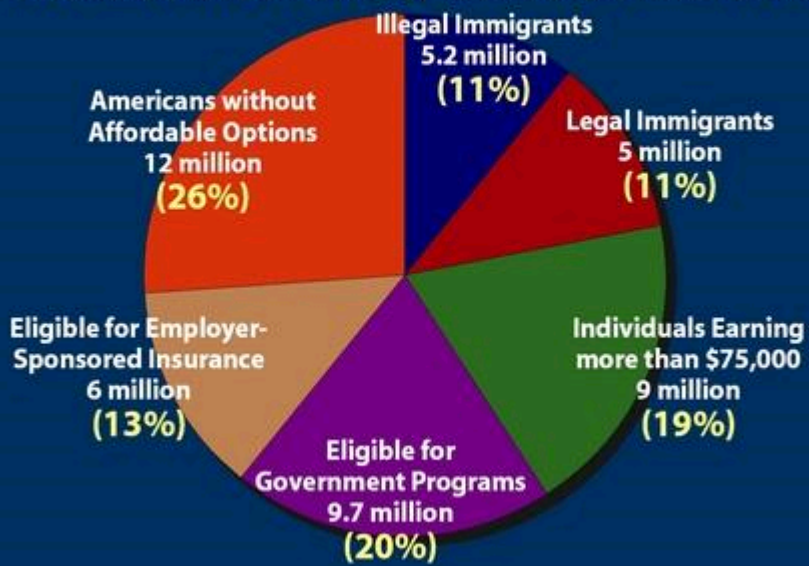

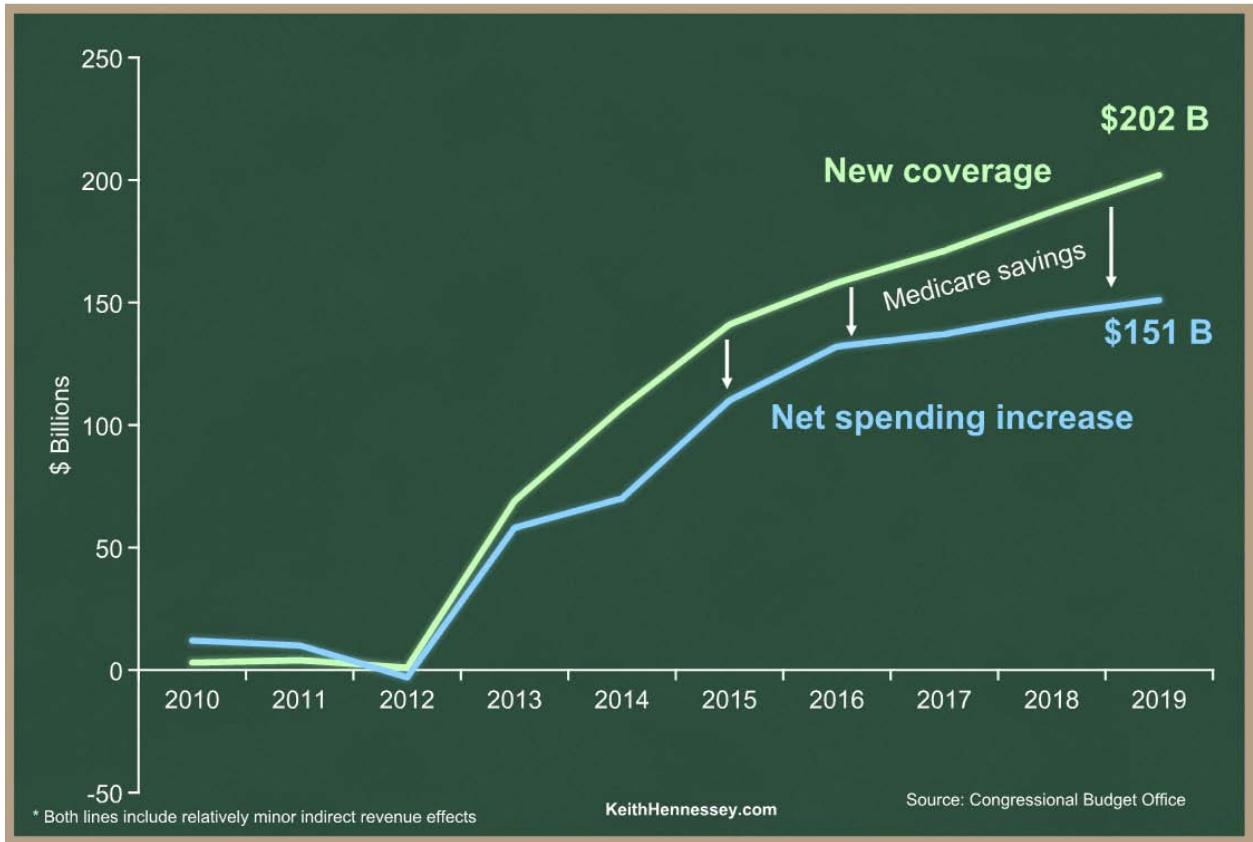

Breakdown of the 47 Million Uninsured

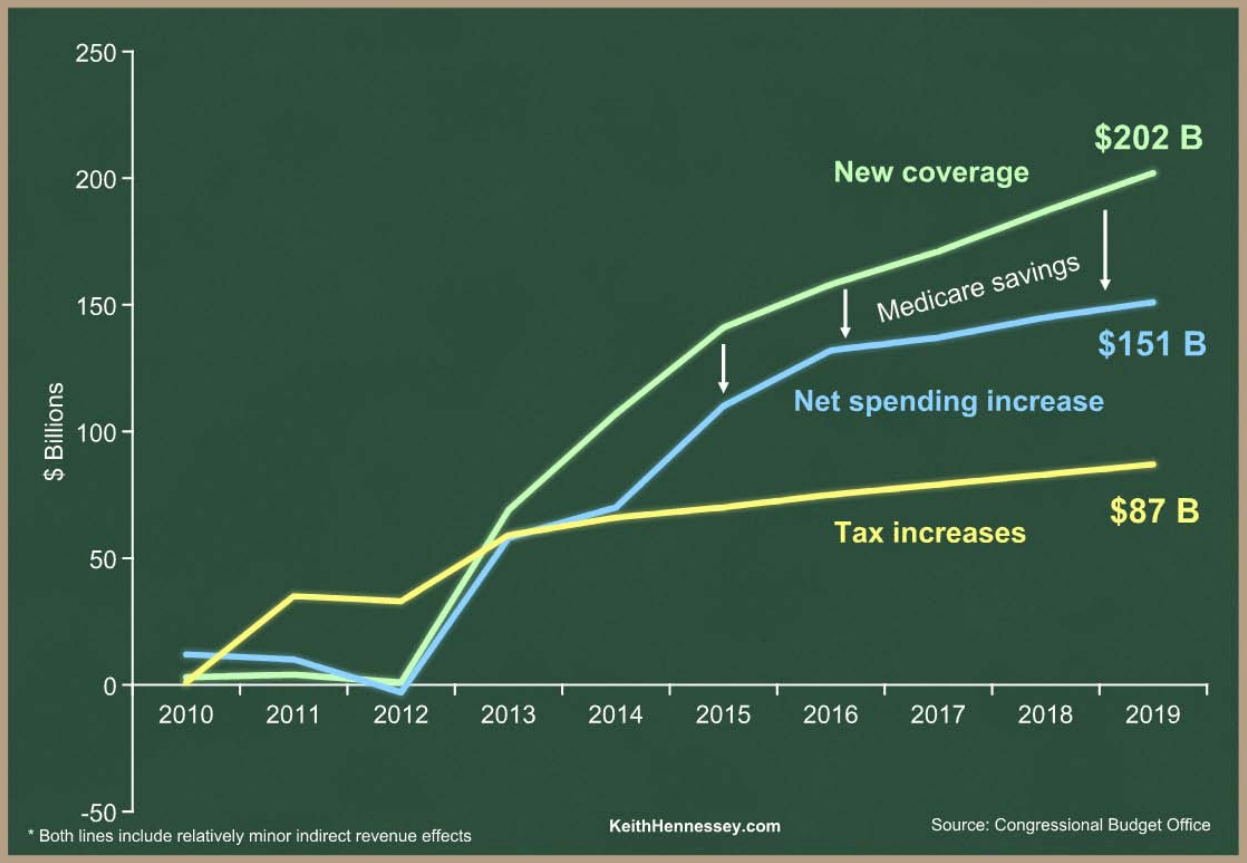


Spending in the House health care bill

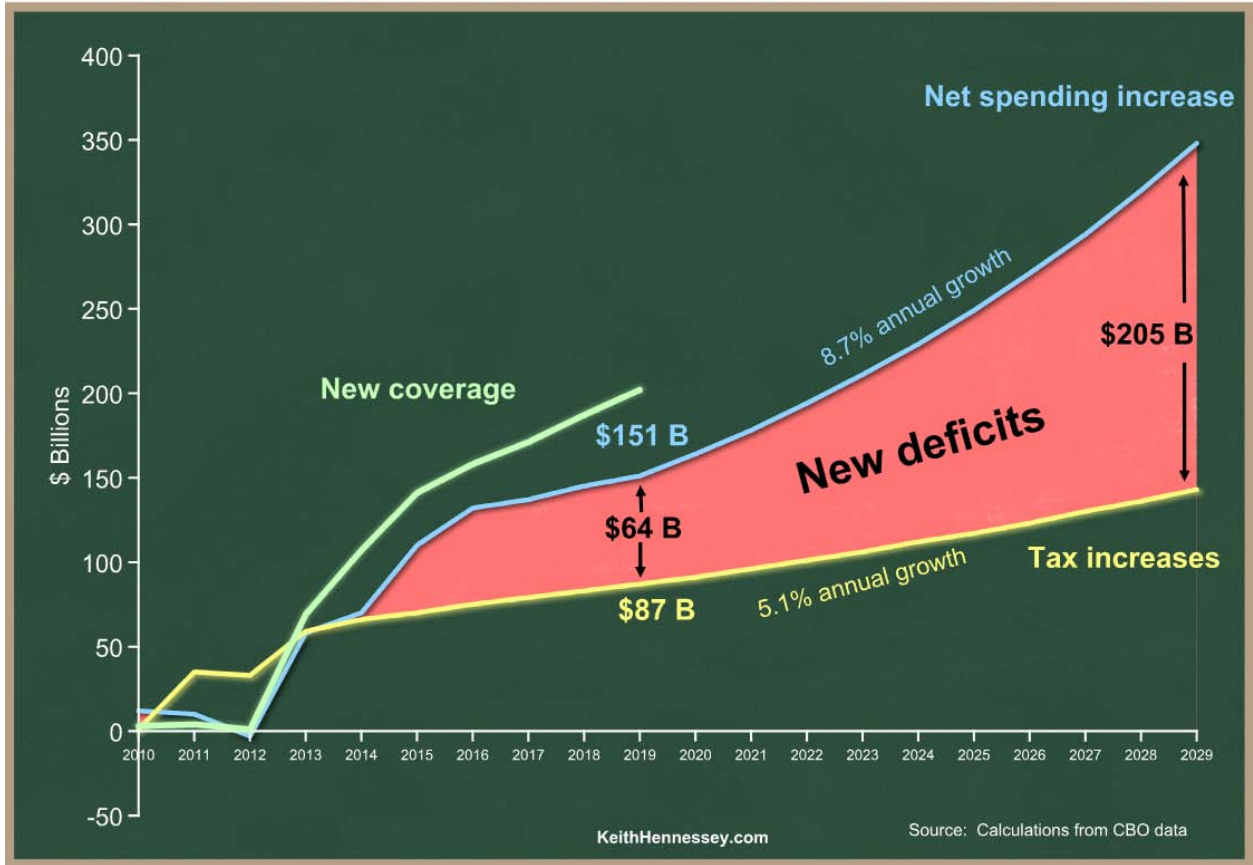
Net deficit effects of new coverage and Medicare provisions



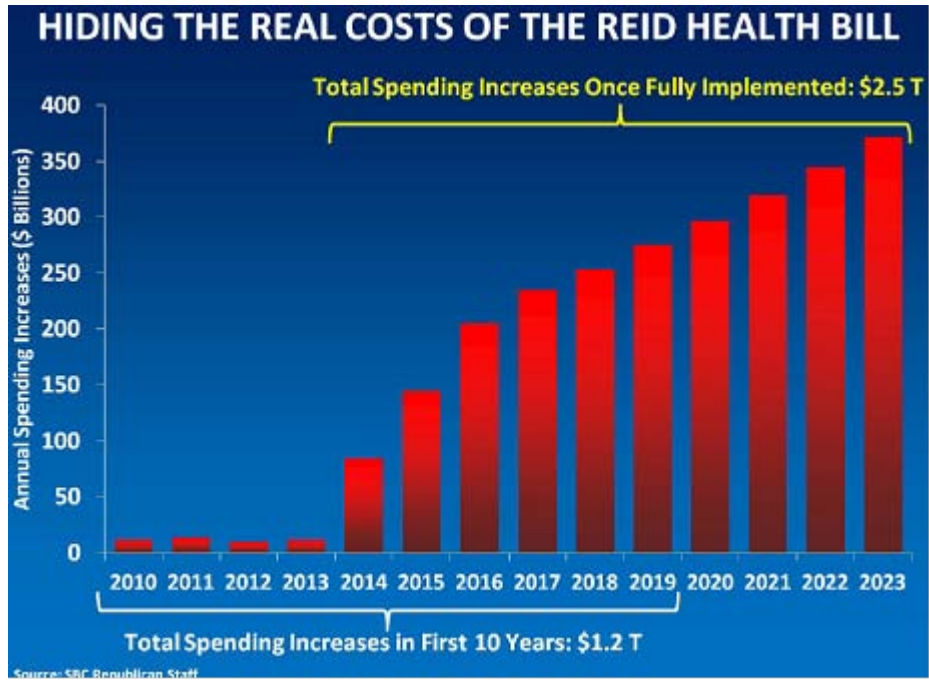
Spending and taxes in the House health care bill

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Possible Reforms (from Dr. Bala Ambati)

Tort Reform

Eliminate television and direct to consumer pharmaceutical marketing

Allow Cross-State (Interstate) Insurance

Encourage charity care (allow tax deduction pro bono work)

Much greater cost transparency – allow doctors to set their own fees and waive fees

“Costs in the last six months of year of life consume the lion’s share of health care spending; should the bill for that be covered by the hospital, the insurance pool, the taxpayer, or (in my view) the patient & family?”
